Important of facing in Vastu

Two things are very important things to consider in Vastu, Direction and Facing. What do we mean by facing in Vastu? The direction in which we are looking, is called the facing. Many questions arise in mind while talking about facing.

Whenever we perform an activity, our face is in some direction like seating in an office chair or having lunch. Suppose the office seat is facing South for one person and North for another person, how are these two different? Or for that matter, how is the toilet seat facing east or west different?

Understanding Science

Our earth is a giant magnet with a north pole and a south pole. Magnetic waves move from the North to South pole. This is a well-established scientific fact.

Our earth also spins west to east and hence, the Sun rises in the East and sets in the West. Simple science stuff. These are two facts one needs to understand well to grasp the science of facing in Vastu.

Coming back to Vastu now. Energy is said to move from North to South and East to West. Facing in Vastu is all about conserving and increasing the life energy (Prana) so that you remain more alive all day. If for some reason you feel tired, irritated, down or depressed most of the time, it might be due to wrong facing.

Let's now take few common questions regarding facing:

Which direction should the head be while sleeping?

East is Best. South is second best. North to be avoided at all cost.

People who are of old age and looking for early death or the head of a person who is already dead is kept in the North.

Which direction should I face during Puja, Sadhana etc?

Anywhere between North to East. Facing other directions is done for a very particular type of Puja and is not recommended for general people in home settings.

Which direction should I face while cooking or eating?

North or East. The South must be avoided. Which direction should I face while using the toilet?

South or West. North and East must be avoided.

Which direction should I face during intercourse?

South or West. North and East must be avoided. Also, activity during the day to be avoided especially during sunrise and sunset.

Which direction should I face during cutting hairs/Shaving?

East or North.

Can a Guru face South?

Yes, only a Guru who is a realized master should face South while conversing with his students. AdiGuru, Shiv Linga in Ujjain and Dakshina Murti God Shiva are examples of Gurus facing South. Shiv Linga in the home temple MUST face North.

Which direction should I face while leaving for auspicious work?

Face towards North or East and take a few steps in that direction before moving towards your destination. Valmiki Ramayan has numerous examples where Sri Ram and others first faced North to perform SwastiVachan before moving towards their destination.

Is there a face I should consider for an office chair or generally sitting for a long time?

Yes, Facing North is Best. If not, East is also good, especially during sunrise time. South facing must be avoided for a longer period of time. Is there any basis or a general rule to follow while considering facing any task?

In general,

- 1) Any auspicious work,
- 2) Anything where the life energy of body is going up like cooking, eating, puja etc

is done facing North or East.

This is because facing North or East naturally increases the life energies of the body and the person feels more alive.

In general,

- 1) Any inauspicious work,
- 2) Anything where the life energy of body is going down like during act of toilet or intercourse,
- 3) When a Guru (with immense life energy) is teaching his students, or
- 4) While during puja where prime intension is hurting someone

is done facing South or West.

This is because facing South or West naturally sucks the life energies of the body and the person feels more drenched.

The Curious Case of the Rotary Anns: Unveiling the Mystery

Have you ever wondered where the charming term "Rotary Ann" comes from? Buckle up, because the answer, like many historical tidbits, is shrouded in a delightful blend of fact and playful theories.

One story paints a picture of a train journey in 1914. Imagine a train full of male Rotarians (members of Rotary clubs) heading to a convention. Back then, wives rarely joined, but Mrs. Bru Brunnier defied the norm. Enter Los Angeles, where another trailblazer, Mrs. Guy Gundaker, boarded. Suddenly, there were two "Anns" on this predominantly male train! A lighthearted chant erupted: "Rotary Ann! Rotary Ann!" The playful cheer stuck, becoming a badge of honor for these early "Rotary spouses" and a symbol of their budding support network.

But the stories don't stop there! Here are some other theories that add a touch of intrigue:

- Ann Dunn, the Inspiration: Maybe the name honors a remarkable woman named Ann Dunn. Her husband was a Rotarian, and Mabel Whiteside, another Rotarian's wife, is believed to be the first recognized "Rotary Ann" in 1914. Mabel's passion for service mirrored Ann's, and this spirit of collaboration inspired wives across the globe to join forces.
- A Common Name, a Meaningful Choice: Some suggest "Rotary Anns" reflects the popularity of the name "Ann" in the early 20th century. Many women's groups adopted popular names like the "Marys" or the "Helenas." Perhaps "Rotary Anns" simply acknowledged the many "Anns" within the Rotary family.
- An Acronym for Support: Historians sometimes propose "Rotary Anns" stands for "Auxiliary of Rotary Nations." This theory suggests the name reflects their role as a support system for Rotary International, with "Anns" acting as a shorthand.
- A Playful Anniversary Nod: Some Rotarians believe the name is a playful twist on "anniversary," commemorating Rotary International's founding in 1905. It could be a way to celebrate both Rotary's legacy and the crucial role women played in its success.

While we may never know the exact origin, one thing's clear: "Rotary Anns" embodies a spirit of service, love, and dedication that transcends the years. Whether born from a train ride, a remarkable woman, a popular name, or a clever acronym, it's a reminder of the vital role women have played in Rotary's journey, evolving from supportive spouses to full-fledged members driving positive change.

THE OFFICIAL ROTARY FLAG

An official flag was formally adopted by Rotary International at the 1929 Convention in Dallas, Texas. The Rotary flag consists of a white field with the official wheel emblem emblazoned in gold in the center of the field The four depressed spaces on the rim of the Rotary wheel are colored royal blue. The and "International' words "Rotary" printed at the top and bottom depressions on the wheel rim are also gold. The shaft in the hub and the key way of the wheel are white. The first official Rotary flag reportedly was flown in Kansas City Missouri, in January 1915. In 1922 a small Rotary flag was carried over the South Pole by Admiral Richard Byrd, a member of the Winchester, Virginia Rotary Club. Four years later, the admiral carried a Rotary flag in his expedition to the North Pole. Some Rotary clubs use the official Rotary flag as a banner at club meetings.

In these instances it is appropriate to print the words "Rotary Club" above the wheel symbol, and the name of the city, state or nation below the emblem.

The Rotary flag is always prominently displayed at the World Headquarters as well as at all conventions and official events of Rotary International.

ROTARY'S WHEEL EMBLEM

A wheel has been the symbol of Rotary since our earliest days. The first design was made by Chicago Rotarian Montague Bear, an engraver who drew a simple wagon wheel, with a few lines to show dust and motion. The wheel was said to illustrate "Civilization and Movement." Most of the early clubs had some form of wagon wheel on their publications letterheads. Finally, in 1922, it was decided that all Rotary clubs should adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians. Thus, in 1923, the present gear wheel, with

24 cogs and six spokes was "Rotary adopted the by International Association." A group of engineers advised that the geared wheel was

mechanically unsound would not work without a "keyway" in the center of the gear to attach it to a power shaft. So, in 1923 the keyway was added and the design which we now know was formally adopted as the official Rotary International emblem

(This is the transcript of an actual radio conversation of a US naval ship with Canadian authorities off the coast of Newfoundland in October, 1995. Radio conversation released by the Chief of Naval Operations on November 10, 1995)

Americans: Please divert your course 15 degrees to the North to avoid a collision.

Canadians: Recommend you divert YOUR course 15 degrees to the South to avoid a collision.

Americans: This is the Captain of a US Navy ship. I say again, divert YOUR course.

WE ARE ACCOMPANIED BY THREE DESTROYERS, THREE CRUISERS, AND NUMEROUS SUPPORT VESSELS. I DEMAND THAT YOU CHANGE YOUR COURSE 15 DEGREES NORTH, THAT'S ONE FIVE DEGREES NORTH, OR COUNTER-MEASURES WILL BE UNDERTAKEN TO ENSURE THE SAFETY
